Anjana Appachana was born and raised in India, and educated at Delhi University, Jawaharlal Nehru University, and Pennsylvania State University. Her previous books are *Incantations & Other Stories* and a novel, *Listening Now.* Her short stories have received the O' Henry Festival award and have been included in several anthologies in the UK, including *Mirrorwork: Fifty years of Indian*

In addition, they have been published in anthologies and journals in the US and India. Her work has also been translated into German and French.

Appachana is the recipient of a National Endowment for the Arts Creative Writing Fellowship. She splits her time between the US and India.
