Based in Los Angeles, British-born Alexander Stuart is a novelist and screenwriter, whose books have been translated into eight languages and published in the US, Britain, Europe, Israel and around the world.

His most controversial novel, *The War Zone*, about a family torn apart by incest, was turned into a searingly emotional film by Oscar nominated actor/director, Tim Roth. Stuart's non-fiction account of the eight years he spent living in Miami, *Life On Mars*, formed the basis for his Channel 4 television documentary, *The End Of America*.
